Nanking, espital of China, swaits the entry of the Red armies, accepted only ten miles away. The Only Chiang Kai-shok's successor, acting president Li Tsung-jen, with Chu Chang Wei, his chief advisor, remains in Manking — preparing, reports say, to make peace. The government has moved to Centon, where Chiang sprang to power twenty-three years ago. On the great Mangitze River, which links Manking with Shanghai, gumboats stead guard as thousands of nationalist troops are ferried to defend the capital — although all signs point to its surrender. The soldiers add to the unbelievable congestion as refugees hurry out of the city in ever-increasing numbers.

Even as the refugees flee, Nationalist and Communist leaders swap new charges and once again hope for peace fades in China.
