FIR SHEEPS PORTS? - 71 DEAD

A fortnight after the first outbreak of fire South of Berdeaux, flames continue to sucep unabated through the Gironde province. Advancing on a 30-wile front - and fanned in some places, by a 20-wile-an-hour breeze - the blase trails have through the rich vineyard countryside. Already, 200 square miles of timber and farm land are laid waste - whole villages wiped out. Banage is set at ten million pounds. Graver still is the toll of human life - 71 confirmed deaths, mostly among troops fire-fighting - many more feared lost.

With the flames at their docrates, ferest-duellers flee from the path of the terrer, fearing encirclement by the raging inferme. Three hundred homes and farms are devastated.

Fresh outbreeks of fire are spetted, as French pelice announce that arean is suspected. Arrests have already been made. Meanwhile, a division of soldiers is called out to try to arrest the march of the fire through land tinder-dry after the arid summer. As these pictures are taken, news come that British volunteer firemen were racing by ear to join the French. As day turns into might, and night into day, France's government votes swift emergency aid to the victims of her greatest national disaster since the war.
