Tarmouth - little Isle of Wight port of fewer than a thousand people - puts the flags out. The occasion is a great one - for Hr. Smith (the Mr. Smith - commin of the Yarmouth lifeboat) is going out to sea to bring home two of the town's most famous citizens. Dozens of yashts, dinghies and rewing beats go out with him to form a maval guard of homeur for a tiny, home-made sleep - that but a few days before - had braved the Atlantic. The Hova Espere with its gallant two-man crew - Stanley and Colin Smith - comes home to a triumphant reception. The Smiths have done enough sailing for a while and it seems only right that they be tweed into pert.

The Smiths, who made famous a name shared by mearly a million Britans, are given a civic reception. The Freeden of the Town is theirs. The little fishing part is proud of its boys - these two tough sailers whose opic 43-day Atlantic battle made them the nation's herces. What a day this is for Yarmouth - a day that will still be recalled 50 years hence.

Another salute to the Smith boys - wrote a fine page in Britain's story of the seas and to their stout-hearted little craft.
