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HAPSBURG PRINCESS WEDS PRINCE OF LIECHTENSTEIN

In a small French village, the faded glories of the Viennese Court shine for a day. An Austrian Princess marries a Liechtenstein Prince, and 2,000 Lignieres villagers turn out to watch a Royal wedding. Accompanied by her mother, ex-Empress Zita and her brother, Archduke Otto, Elisabeth Charlotte - youngest daughter of Austria's last Emperor - walks to the 12th century village church, there to wed the heir to the throne of the world's smallest principality - Prince Henri Marie Vincent Benoit of Liechtenstein. The marriage vows are made in German.

With none of the glitter of a Royal wedding, two young members of ancient Royal families - become man and wife. A great-great-niece of Emperor Francis Joseph, the Hapsburg Princess wears a brilliant white satin gown, with a two-hundred-year-old lace veil, once worn by Marie Antoinette. With the Princess' mother are her five brothers and the pretender to the Austrian throne Archduke Otto. There too, are members of Europe's displaced Royalty, but no golden carriages, no Imperial guard - but at least a moat to cross. Future home for the couple will be in Liechtenstein - pocket-size state between Austria and Switzerland.
