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BUTSDURG PRINCIPS WEDS PRINCE OF MEGAVERS WITH

In a small French village, the faded gleries of the Viennese Court shine for a day. An Austrian Princess marries a Licehtenstein Prince, and 2,000 Lignieres villagers turn out to watch a Royal wedding. Accompanied by her mether, ex-impress Eita and her brother, Archdule Otte, Elizabeth Charlotte - youngest daughter of Austria's last Emperer - walks to the 12th century village church, there to wed the heir to the throne of the world's smallest principality - Prince Henri Marie Vincent Bemoit of Licehtenstein. The marriage vows are made in German.

With none of the glitter of a Royal wedding, two young members of ancient Royal families - become man and wife. A great-great-niese of Emperor Francis Joseph, the Hapsburg Princess wears a brilliant white satin gown, with a two-hundred-year-old lace veil, once worn by Marie Antoinette. With the Princess' mother are her five brothers and the pretender to the Austrian throne Archduke Otto.
