And now for a champion in the making! His head covered in the manner of his excestors, he fights with the fury of a doman. It's a Cherokee Indian, Earl Walls, from Ganada - already hailed as a successor to Joe Louis. Pounding his dark skinned French epponent - Albert Coulbaly into submission, the 21-year-old Canadian scores his fourth first-round trimph in Britain. The Frenchman, hopelessly outclassed, never has a chance against this lethal attack.

It's taken Walls only just over 100 seconds to send his well-built eppenent into the land of dreams. If he keeps this form there's a World championship for Earl Walls.
