Fourteen nen with a mission meet in the Part of Londen. Led by Squadrem-Ldr. Walford of the R.A.F. and Captain Giasver from Merway, they are off on a 9,000 mile journey to the South Polar regions - to an arotic waste, where no man has ever set foot. In the MORSEL, a 700-tan converted scaling ship, this party of Britens, Swedes and Merwegians will make for Queen Maud Land and from there, start exploring by dog teams. For the next two years, their only contact with the outside world will be by wireless. All available space is filled and stores overflow onto the decks. A non-political voyage of adventure, it's a journey in the interests of science.
