First pictures from behind the Iron Curtain for some months show how Poland is getting ready for the clash of nations on the sports-field. Top sportsmen - and women - are going back to school, for the Soviet-controlled states are making no bones about the fact that they are out to win. The <u>practical</u> side is worked out in the spacious grounds of Warsaw's sports academy. There, a squad of instructors keep the students on their toes ready to deal with any situation.

Those in favour of it, point to the pre-war successes of the Germans, and the triumph in England of the Moscow Dynamos. Those against say that this sort of thing turns the sportsman into a machine, kills the amateur and stifles all individualism. Gone are the days when a sporting triumph brought fame only to the individual. Unless Britain prepares seriously to meet the challenge of other nations, we'll maintain our tradition of being the world's best losers.
