DUBLIN CROWDS SEE IRISH RUCKY TRIDOCH

Scotland comes to Dublin, as at Lansdowne Road, the men of Ireland prepare to do battle with the Scots in their sixty-first meeting of the International Rugby Championship. The capacity growd that packs the historic Dublin venus almost raises the roof off the stand as Elliott leads the dark-shirted Scots on to the field, with the Irish fifteen, headed by Karl Mullen hard after them.

President Sean O'Helly gets a big evation, as he goes out (first to meet the Scots and then the Irish team) for whom this is their first appearance at home this season.

Ricking off, Scotland are first away, but it's not long before it becomes clear that this is Ireland's day. Perhaps it's because they are playing at home: perhaps it's because of the new three-quarter lime. Whatever the reason, this is the Ireland that won the Triple Crown for the past two years. Resping their opponents penned inside their "25," the speedy, determined Irishmen force the pase relentlessly. Half an hour's play have gone, when they draw shead - George Norten kicking a great penalty goal.

By half-time, Mullen's men have increased their lead to sim-mil, but, as the second half opens, it's Scotland who do the attacking. With the wind behind them, they charge into the attack, but are brought to a halt by the first-time tackles of the Irish three-quarters.

A brilliant handling movement puts Ireland into a commanding lead. The man who brings it off is Blaymey, No. 13. Dashing past Burrell, he scores the try of the match - sefely converted by that great goal-kicker, George Norton.

With no win to the credit yet this season, Ireland go all out to make up for it. Curtis touches down try No. 2 - and the crowd goes wild, as Norton again adds the extra points.

Out to prove they are still the best team in the Triple Crown Championship, Ireland make this their biggest-ever win over Scotland. From a Kyle pass, Crown goes ever for yet another touch-down, to which Norton duly adds the finishing touch. And Dublin's jubilation knows no limit.
