

GLASGOWSMALLPOX CITY QUEUES FOR VACCINATION

Vaccination is order of the day in Glasgow, as the city lines up in the battle against smallpox. The dreaded disease was carried into Glasgow by an Indian seaman, who has since been discharged from hospital, cured. Nineteen people caught his illness; two died. Outside Medical centres, thousands queue up for voluntary vaccination. Reports that vaccine is running low have been denied. More supplies are being flown in daily. As the outbreak reaches its most critical phase, vaccinations near 200,000. Doctors and nurses work in twelve-hour relays, to combat the scourge. 600-an-hour are treated in the Medical Centre in Cochrane Street and Pathé cameraman Bill McCenville - who took these pictures - is among them. Calm and orderly, the people of Glasgow (young and old) are eager to follow the advice of the city's medical officers.
