From Marshal Tite's Ingoslavia come first pictures of an election campaign staged for the benefit of foreign eyes. Righty thousand Slavs turn out in the Dalmatian city of Split to hear their leader campaign for his own particular brand of Communist Dictatorship, knowing full well that the result is already decided. A victory dance procedes the voting, for with only one set of candidates listed, the Communist-led "People's Front" must, of course, win. To nobedy's surprise, Tite's party piles up a 95 per cent vote. No victory for democracy, it aids the West nonetheless, for it is a victory over Soviet-style Communism. (Germany) In Berlin, Soviet Porces come face to face with those of democracy. In a mammeth rally, Russian-trained youth organisations try to grash into the Western Zone.

With the Reds planning a major march on Berlin at Whitsum, this Easter clash previews troubles to come in a city that remains the het point in the celd war. (America) That the battle of ideologies stretches far and wide is proved by the trial of Labour leader Harry Bridges in San Francisco. After an 81-day Court session, the American Government's 10-year battle to deport the Australian-born Union Chief (here seen playing chess) hinges on the jury's decision as to whether he was ever a Communist, which he denied under oath. The jurers, in giving their verdict, tell Judge Harris that Bridges lied to gain American citisenship and that he is a Communist. Bridges is sentenced to five years in prison on pergury charges, but as he leaves the Court room on bail he tells reporters that he will appeal.

Unlike their American comrades, French Communists disdain words and go in for action instead. In Paris, more than a thousand Reds clash with police outside the Figure Newspaper building in the Champs Elysses. Although supposedly in protest agains the Figure's publication of the memoirs of Gestape chief Otto Skorseny, the Communists use the occasion to incite a strike against the Bidault Government. When police reinforcements are called into battle, the fireworks begin.

The tranquil atmosphere of Paris-in-the-Spring is rudly disturbed by a gang of het-heads, who want to turn the French capital into another battleground in the cold war.
