And it's not necessary to tell an Irishman that it's the <u>Horse</u> Show we're talking about ... they all seem to be there, anyway. For horse-lovers it's the greatest show in the world, and if you do well there, horse and rider rank in the top class.

Watching the judging is Minister for Justice, General Sean MacBoin. Winner in class 45 is Shirley Knowles.

In the Pembroke Hall the trade exhibition reports more stands than last year. There are all kinds of interesting displays.

But there's one stand that draws all the grown-ups.

Now it's time to get back to the horse show, where President O'Kelly is accompanied by Mr. MacMahon, President of the Royal Dublin Society, and Colonel Sullivan. Among the entrants are crack riders from Italy and France. And here's Competition B for hunters, with Lt. Colonel Dadgeon ghing round on "Seafarer," to finish third.

And here's the winner, Captain W. B. Mullins on "September."

The extremely high level of jumping at the show set the judges some tricky problems. That's high tribute to riders and mounts alike, but it's only what is expected at the Royal Dublin.
