THEIR MAJESTIES IN POPLAR

They're building in Poplar to replace the nearly 10-thousand homes destroyed in the blits. In the Lansbury neighbourhood a self-contained community is rising that will feature in the Festival of Britain Live Architecture Exhibition.

A new school rises on Ricardo Street where 500 beys and girls will grow into the citizens of temorrow. Poplar is old, its homes cramped and old-fashiomed. Thirteen hundred high-emplosives, 50-V-weapons and 30-thousand incendiaries destroyed half the houses in Hitler's attempt to stampede East London. In their place, complete villages will be built, with blocks of flats, houses, schools, shopping centres, markets, pubs and parks. In the Lansbury neighbourhood the work's going shead fast.

In old Poplar the markst-place is a busy centre, and in the multitude of stalls there's precious little you can't find. The markets come down through the centuries - a real part of London's life and laughter. But these days there's hardly room to laugh.

But now there's excitement. The King and Queen are coming to see what Poplar is deing.

In the Ricardo street school their Majesties see a model of the complete school. Here is how the school will look when finished.

In the grounds of the school (which replaces one which was destroyed) their Majesties plant purple Morway maples, and then autograph the spadds used.

In time, there'll be neighbourhoods like Lansbury. It's the dawn of a new era for Lendon's East End.
