AUSTRALIAN GOLDEN FLEECE WOOL

These days Australia rides to new heights of presperity on a sheep's back. Their weel's so valuable it doesn't pay to kill them, so if you're wendering where all the lamb and mut ten's get to, there's your answer. In the shearing sheds the clippers are busy as skilled men elip up to 150 sheep a day and earn themselves about eight penads, for their trouble. Last season Australia earned 400-million pounds from weel experts. This year weel has seared up to as much as 27 shillings a pound.

Here's the elip from one sheep. Let's see what it's like when it's spread out. We wonder it pays better to keep them for their wool growing! An all-nations scramble for weel for uniforms is one of the chief causes of the steep rise in price. After the elip has been picked over for short or dirty pieces the weel is packed in huge bales for the market. With that lead off their minds, the sheep become almost airborne.

Throughout the sheeplands huge flocks move towards the sheds. More than ever in its history, weel means wealth.
