WALES V. IRELAND - RUGEY

With barely a minute gone a penalty is given against Ireland. New cap Ben Edwards of Newport takes the kick.

It's over and Wales lead by three points to mil.

O'Meara gets it and passes to Kyle. Kyle to Henderson and the Queen's man is away. He's tackled but passes to MeKay. McKay to Lane who runs across field. He's tackled but passes back to McKay. Everybedy's up there now. There's a bit of muddled play. Anything can happen. The Irish are fighting hard to equalise. The ball comes loose and Ireland have it. It works out to Kyle. And he's touched down for Ireland, halfway between the flag and the goal-post.

Miller takes the kick.

He fails to convert and it's three all.

Resuming after the interval, Wales try desperately to regain the lead, and it's a hard tough battle. The ground's out up rather badly and the ball's heavy and slippery.
