In the dusty yard of a Karean school they assemble to salute the men who held the Injin line. Before the United Nations commander in the field the less than 50 survivers parade to receive America's highest honour; and General van Vliet abandons his prepared speech and as a soldier speaks as a soldier feels. For what they and their conrades did was more than is often asked of man. For four days the Glousesters and G. Troop 170th Independent Mortar Battery withstood a Chinese Army. 600 fell, but the Injin line was held, whilst the allies reformed.

To war correspondents, these who came back tell the opic story in stumbling, unskilled words. They fought till there was no more with which to fight and then they came out through the battle, laggard, lumgry but with empty rifles still held high, the bravest of the brave.
