MYSTERY EXPLOSIONS START OIL FIRE

Newark, New Jersey. A series of explosions race through the tanks of an eighty acre gas storage plant. Smoke and flames darken the sky as seventy tanks blow up.

The tanks, seventy feet long and ten feet in diameter, were filled with liquified propane - bottled gas used for light and cooking. The force of the blast hurled tanks three-quarters of a mile. By miracle, no one is killed and only eleven injured. But the damage of five million dollars makes it the worst blaze in Newark's history.
