## MISTERY EXPLOSIONS START OIL FIRE

Howark, New Jersey. A series of explosions race through the tanks of an eighty acre gas sterage plant. Smoke and flames darken the sky as seventy tanks blow up.

The tanks, seventy feet long and ten feet in dismeter, were filled with liquified propone - bottled gas used for light and cocking. The force of the blast hurls tanks three-quarters of a mile. By miracle, no one is killed and only eleven injured. But the damage of five million dollars makes it the worst blase in Newark's history.

Smoke and flames helf a mile high darken the weekend skies as a series of mysterious explosions race through the status tanks on an eighty-acre gas "teak farm" in the heart of the industrial meadewlands of Newark, New Jersey. Seventy of the farm's hundred storage tanks blow up and the fire's so hot that firemen can't get mear it for hours. The tanks, seventy feet long and ten feet in diameter, were filled with liquified propane -- the bottled gas used for home cooking. Such wax the blastis force that tanks are hurled three-quarters of a mile. Miraculously, no one is killed, and only eleven are injured. But the damage reaches five million dollars and it's the worst blaze in Newark's history.
