From the little house where he had spent but twenty-four days after six years imprisonment in the island fortress, Petain begins his last journey. Marshal of France, he was tried and condemned by his own people for treason. Behind him walks General Weygand, his army chief when he was head of the Vichy government.

To the little cemetery of Port Joinville they carry the man to whom France would have paid her highest honours had he died before his love for France made him betray her honour. But in death the little people remember only the man who saved France at Verdun ... they and the veterans of Verdun where he asked to be buried. Instead, in a little graveyard where lie a number of our own war dead they bury the last Marshal of France.

LONDON

In London, Mrs. Attlee at the International Film Exhibition takes excellent advice - only here it's mostly still pictures from past and present great films ... a representative selection from the studios of eight countries. From a thousand stills selected 160 were chosen. This is Vera-Ellen in "Happy Go Lovely." Joan Bowling and Petula Clark are fascinated by a granddaddy of all projectors. But it did show the sensation of its time - the first moving pictures. And this is what the first camera looked like. Funny, aren't they? But today's finest entertainment traces way back to these pioneer machines.
