## FUNERAL OF A MARSHAL

General de Lattre de Tassigny, one of the greatest of France's soldiers, leaves for the Invalides (where Mapeleon rests) for France's last highest homour. In the space of menths, his wife mourns a son who died in Indo-China and now a husband. For two years General Eisenhower knew him as Commander-in-Chief of Western Union Ground Perces under Field Marshal Montgemery. Then as High Commissioner in Indo-China he stemmed the tide of Red onslaught, but lest his son in battle.

At the Arc de Triemphe, where lies the Unknown Soldier of France, President Auriel confers France's last and highest honeur. In death, General Jean de Lattre de Tassigny becomes a Marshal of France. It is a symbol to his widow that France mourns a great son whose services she can ill spare.
