LAND'S END WRECK DRAMA

Dawn breaks off the Cormish coast after a might of disaster at Whipped by 80-mile-em-hour squalls, the great rollers sweep in from the Atlantic, frightening in their might and unjoyty; and from all round Britain come reports of wreek and peril. Close under Pendeen Light lies the Liberian ship "Liberty." Swept up by the force of the gale, the five-theusand-tenner was flung on to the rocks in Portheras Cove where Pathe comeramon Ken Gordon found her. Twenty-five of her erew had been saved. But with dawn faint shouts report thirteen still enheard. Hastily summoned, the St. Just Life Saving Team fire another line across to the ship they'd left only a few hours earlier. Onbeard, the erew secure the light line and draw across the tough riding-line attached to it. The shore party acknowledge the O.K. and the first man climbs into the breeches-busy. In these exclusive pictures Pathe News brings you the actual rescue scenes. Hage seas leap up as though angry at being cheated of their proy, but through them the men ride smoothly to safety, thanks to the volunteers from St. Just.

One by one the men are brought to safety by the erew of twenty life-savers, to join these saved during the night. Spray-drenehed and shivering in the bitter cold, the men - mestly Arabs and Greeks can barely stand as they reach land. Two hundred feet below, the others wait their turn, as the seas hanner their ship in Portheras Cove, one of the mest dangerous corners on the English coast.

The last man. Now no more remain onbeard and our dramatic story comes to an end. "Liberty" lies shattered on the rocks but man lives on, thanks to the helping hand of his brothers.
