NEW YORK HAILS CAPT. CARLSEN

Welcomed at Idlewild Airport by his wife and daughters, Captain Kurt Carlson, here of the "Flying Enterprise" reaches New York. Mrs. Carlson was ill in America all through her husband's 15 days ordeal. Next morning, onboard the Coastguard cutter "Saul," the Carlsons sail up New York Harbour to Battery Pier to receive the city's efficial welcome.

After landing with his wife and daughters Sonja and Earen, the stocky, 37-year-old Danish-born captain runs into another kind of storm.

After receiving New York's Medal of Honour from Mayor Impelliteri at City Hall, Carlson, speaking from a reproduction of "Enterprise's" stern, spurns radio and movie offers worth thousands of pounds, says he'll go back to sea.

Landing in New York's Idlewild Airport, Captain Henrik Kurt Carlson is greeted by his wife and daughters, A few weeks ago he was just another sea captain. Today - thanks to his opic attempt to save his ship -- he's an international hero. The Carlsons head for a five hour rest in Brooklyn. Themearly the next morning, thursdowntribundaduttershork aboard the bridge of the Coast Guard outter Saul, they sail up New York harbor to the Battery's Pier A. Accompanied by Mrs Carlson, and daughters firm Sonja and Karen, the stocky, thirty-seven year-old, Danish-born, square-jawed sea deg runs into a new storm - a paper one.
