At Louveciennes, where SHAPE Headquarters are situated, General Eisenhower is made Citizen of the town, before his departure to the United States and his presidential campaign. Greeted by Mayor in front of the City Hall General Eisenhower and Madame, hear a declaration of friendship from the town First Magistrate.

Later in the morning, in a ceremony on the Invalides Square, General Eisenhower is awarded the French highest Military Medal, the Croix de Guerre, picture shows :

- Arrival of General Eisenhower, accompanied by Mr. PINAY, Prime Minister and Mr. Rene PLEVEN, Minister of Defense.
- the three bow to the flag
(intermediary shot with sound material)
- Mr. Pinay hands the Croix de Guerre (general views matching with sound material)
- General Eisenhower inspecting troops march-passing in front of officials
- General looking at his new decoration with interest, before Messrs Pinay and Plevin

At 13 hours, General Eisenhower goes to the Arch of Triumph to pay a last tribute to victims of both World Wars at the Unknown Soldier's grave. He lays a wreath before his departure to the U.S.

General and Mrs. Eisenhower then were guests of President Auriol who meets them in Elysee's gardens.
