The Bishop of Sarawak greets the Duchess of Kent as she arrives at Kuching, accompanied by her young son the Buke. Already the Duchess has travelled many thousands of miles on her good-will tour of South-East Asia, and now she inspects the Guard of Honour mounted by the Sarawak Constabulary. Thousands of school-children have journeyed many miles to greet her and to see for themselves their most honoured visitor from Britain.

But it is not only the children her Boyal Highness greets. Workers in the Salvation Army come in for special attention. The following day the Duchess joins the congregation who have gathered to watch her lay the foundation stone of the new Sarawak Cathedral.

As they watch the Ducheus perform the ceremony, the crowd of enlockers recall the words of the Bishop in his address that it is with their faith in God that they begin their task of creeting a enthedral that will proclaim their beliefs to all.

Dayaks, resplendent in their native contumes, throng the route the Duchess takes on her tour of Sibu, which is to include the formal opening of the new hospital of Lau King Howe.

Onildren, representing the races who live in Sarawak, hand the scissors to Her Highness with which to perform the ceremony, and, as a reward, pose for a snapshot with the Duchess. At the Residency at Sibu, chief tains express their delight in the reyal visit by bringing gifts, symbols of their good-will and leyalty. A gesture by the Duchess that delights the crowd is when she tries on a coclie's hat. It is by such simple, human actions as these that the Duchess has wen the warm affections of people wherever she has travelled on a journey that has done much to strengthen the bonds between the countries of our Empire.
