ART ON THE HIGH SEAS

CANADIAN SAILORS OF AIRCRAFT CARRIER HMCS MAGNIFICENT ENTHUSIASTIC WIELDERS OF BRUSH --BUT - NOT FOR SWABBING DECKS -

"MAGGIE'S ART CLUB" HUGE SUCCESS
FLAT-TOP COMPETES WITH PARIS' FAMOUS MONTMARTE AS ART CENTRE

Aboard HMCS Magnificent, Halifax, N.S. - December 00, 1952

When HMCS Magnificent sailed on a four-month cruise to the Mediterranean and European waters, the word "painting" had no more immediate significance to her officers and men than adding a new coat of paint to the 18,000 ton carrier's huge hull. But a sea-going artclass, unique in Canadian art annals, has changed all that. A band of 25 enthusiastic sailor artists -- who call themselves "Maggie's Art Club" -- has made the ship's company more art conscientious than a deluxe tour of Paris' famous Montmarte district.

The club was formed by Lieutenant Commander C. Anthony Law, DSC, CD, a former official war artist and well known Canadian painter of landscapes and seascapes. Organizing the club as a hobby group his only requirement for entry was: "anybody who was interested was welcome". Most of the painting was done when the Maggie hit port during its cruise in such varied locales as Greece, Malta, North Africa, England and Scotland. Commander Law and his club literally painted the town - and the countryside.

To quote from TIME magazine: "It was enough to make an old salt weep. On a cruise to the Mediterranean last summer, the sleek gray aircraft carrier Magnificent, pride of Canada's Navy began looking like a ruddy art gallery. The radio room walls sprouted brightly coloured canvasses, the shipwright shop was festooned with art, so was the barber shop".

Commander Law has made no effort to influence the style of his painters. "I have tried to let them develop their own",

he said, "and they have come along amazingly well. Right now we have some who lean towards impressionists, the surrealists, the romanticists, and a few are trying non-objectives for a change".

Maggie's first art class is breaking up as its members get transferred to new ships. But Commander Law's pupils say they will keep on painting - and spread the habit through the Royal Canadian Navy.
