EDEN & BUTLER ARRIVE

Mr. Eden and Mr. Butler, accompanied by their wives, arrive in Washington for talks with their opposite numbers in the new Eisenhower cabinet. Later, in the office of Mr. John Foster Dulles (America's Secretary of State) proposals suggested during the Commonwealth Economic Conference in London last December, are put forward by Mr. Eden. He and Mr. Butler stress that Britain wants Trade - not Aid from America.

Mr. Eden then calls on President Eisenhower at the White House to invite America's co-operation in a wider expansion of world trade.

British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, accompanied by R.A. Butler, Chancellor of the Exchequer, arrives in Washington on a trade mission. He is welcomed by United States Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. Prime purpose of the mission, whose conferences begin almost immediately in Mr Dulles' office, is to discuss the economic and political problems besetting the non-Communist world. Mr Dulles hears the British delegation says they want "trade, not aid." The series of discussions will explore more liberal trade, tariff and payment policies to further the economic welfare of the free world.
