Dag Hammarskjoeld is chosen as the United Nations' Secretary General. The result of the secret ballot was a foregone conclusion as Mr. Viskinsky previously had announced his support.

"I declare therefore the recommendation of the Security Council that the appointment of Mr. Dag Hammerskjoeld accepted."

Resigning from the post as Secretary General, Mr. Trygve Lie says farewell:

> "I thank you for all the kind words, all your support and all your understanding during the past seven years. If I have made mistakes, I hope you will forgive me and I will certainly forgive you."

After a final round of personal farewells, Mr. Lie leaves for the airport to greet his Swedish successor to the U.M's top administrative post.
