
ECHOES FROM THE PAST

One of the earliest reports of a cricket match in existence, cencerns a match at Molesey. In 1723 the "Daily Courant" related that a match was played at Moulsey between Gentlemen of London and Gentlemen of Surrey. And after the game the players were entertained at Hampton Court Palace by Frederick, Prince of Wales.

September, 1731: "A great cricket match was played at Molesey, in Surrey, between the Kingston men and the county of Surrey for 25-guineas-a-side, which was won by the latter. Some thousands of persons of both sexes were present."

First L.B.W. Decision: In 1795 at Molesey, XI of Surrey v. XIII of England. Latter won by 27 runs. In this match leg before wicket is found scored for the first time. Hon. J. TUFTON in 1st innings of England being L.B.W. b. WELLS. July, 1733: A great cricket match was played at Molesey in Surrey, between eleven Surrey men and eleven of Middlesex, which were very hard matched. The Surrey men beat by only 3 notches; at which were present the Prince of Wales accompanied by several persons of distinction and His Royal Highness was pleased to order a guinea to be given to each man for their great dexterity, etc. Just as His Royal Highness was returning from the cricket match into the Court a hare was put up amongst the tents in the Camp on the Green, which being pursued by several soldiers, etc., she took the water: and several Horse Grenadiers being also in pursuit in their jack-boots jumped in after her and caught her before she had swam quite into the middle of the Thames; who all laying claim, a water battle ensued before they could bring their booty on shore, which afforded His Highness and the Nobility much diversion. In 1787 William Beldham made a stroke at Molesey for which 10 were run. This William Beldham who was born in 1766 and died in 1862 was the "great glorious and unrivalled Silver Billy" who played many times for All England. The Rev. John Mitford wrote of him: "It mattered not to him who bowled or how he bowled, fast or slow, high or low, straight or bias; away flew the ball from his bat like an eagle on the wing. Beldham was great in every hit, but his peculiar glory was the cut. Here he stood with no man beside him, the laurel was all his own; it was like the cut of a racket. His wrists seem to turn on spring of the finest steel. He took the ball, as Burke did the House of Commons, between wind and water, not a moment too soon or too late. Beldham still survives. He lives at Farnham and in his kitchen, black with age but like himself still untouched with worms, hangs the trophy of his victories. the delight of his youth, the exercise of his manhood and the glory of his age-his BAT."

June, 1735: "A match at cricket was played at Molesey for a considerable sum of money, eleven a side, the gentlemen of Surrey on the Prince of Wales' side, and the gentlemen of London, called the London Club, on Mr. Steed's side; which was won by the latter, they having one man to come in, and

the former having the misfortune to have one of their best men break one of his fingers by catching the ball; which 'tis thought, was the occasion of them losing the game."

July, 1735: "The great cricket match was played at Moulsey in Surrey, between His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales and the Earl of Middlesex, eldest son of the Duke of Dorset, for £1.000 a-side."

August 21st, 1736: "A great cricket match was played at Molesey, in Surrey, between eleven men of Middlesex and eleven of Surrey, when the latter beat the former by five notches.

And again in July, 1739:

"The great cricket match that had been so long depending was played on Molesey between the gamesters of London and the gamesters of Kingston and Molesey. At first the bets were 6 to 4 on London; the country went in first and got upwards of 100, and then it was 2 to 1 on the country, and the last hands of the country knocked up 8 of their wickets and so won the match easily. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was present all the time."

According to James Pycroft, the cricketing authority, Molesey, with The Holt, near Farnham, were the Surrey County grounds from 1736 to 1791 and it is on record that Surrey played a 13 of England twice on the Molesey Hurst

in 1795.

The Club are the Freeholders of the Ground as a Memorial forever to players who fell in the last great war. The sum of £2,026 was raised in 1943, and the ground is free of debt. The N.Z. Government contributed £100, the Surrey County Council and the Esher U.D.C. £250 each. The new Pavilion is to be erected of brick at a cost of £6,000, of which £3,500 is in hand.

In the Club's long history a ball has never been hit on to Taggs Island. It is hoped that today cricket history will be made. If so, £1,200 will be divided. The hit measured by arc, is 140 yards or more.
