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EVEREST HEROES ARRIVE

From Kathmandu, capital of Nepal, come first pictures of the city's preparations to welcome back the conquerors of Mount Everest. This mighty achievement has a particular significance for these people for it was Sherpa Tensing, the most famous of their pertors, who, with New Zealander Edmand Hillary, triumphed in the final assault.

The first members of the Everest Expedition to reach Kathmandu are the leader Colonel John Hunt and team-mates Bourdillon and Gregory. At Gaucher Airport they watch an aircraft fly Mrs. Hunt in from England. Bourdillon failed to reach the peak by only 500 feet. Mr. A. Gregory was the exygen expert with the team. For his splendid leadership, Colonel Hunt has been honoured with a buighthood.

Growds throng the streets of the capital to celebrate the conquest of the sountain which at last has yielded the secrets it has held since the beginning of time. In procession, troops march through the city to honour Tunning to whom the King of Nepal has given the title "Piger of Tigers."

At the reyal palace in Kathmandu, Colonel Hunt presents a cushion to the Indian Post Master for his help in relaying messages to Britain. Meanwhile, from Everest, the rest of the team begin the descent. Everest - rearing 5g miles towards the substratesphere - for thirty years the goal of adventurers, vanquished at last.

At a camp near the foot of the mountain, others of the expedition rest before moving on to Kathmandu. In such tents as these, they slept high on the slepes of Everest during the ascent.

Shorpas move further up the mountain to greet Millery and Tensing. Dwarfed by the mighty Himalayas, they begin the journey to Kathmandu. The two conquerers lead the triumphant procession.

The crowds swell in the capital as the news spreads that the herees have returned. Thousands join in the jubilant precession, shouting and singing their preises.

Fellowing the great parade comes a small convoy of vehicles carrying the mountaineers.

To the men who first set foot upon the summit of Everest go the congratulations of all. But to their leader, Gelonel Munt, who stood back that victory might be the privilege of others goes the admiration of the whole world.
