After three and a half years in a Hungarian goal, British Citisen Edgar Sanders arrives Hows. The scene is Groydon Airport and Mr. Sanders is accompanied by his three daughters and the wife who fought so hard for his release. Arrested in 1949 on charges of espionage, his sentence of thirteen years has been commuted and he is free once more to enjoy life with his family.

It's a great moment for those intimately concerned but now it's time for a word from Mr. Sanders himself in an exclusive interview with the Daily Herald's Gilbert Carter:-

- How about your time in prison, you were in solitary confinement most of the time I believe.
- A. That's right, the mole time.
- 4. You never heard or saw any of your fellow prisoners?
- A. I only heard one who was in the cell next door but one to me, I recognised him by his footsteps.
- Q. Mr. Vogler mentioned in a book he wrote Mr. Sanders , about the cold water treatment. Bid you over experience that?
- A. No I don't know what cold water treatment is because I have heard about the cold water treatment. I was put into a cell with a stool pigeen during the interrogation and he was talking to me about celd water treatment. They make them drink cold water as many glasses as they can. But I never experienced that. The ealy cold water treatment I experienced was mashing in the morning.
- Q. How about the general treatment of you in the prison?
- A. I had no personal fear of being maltreated at all. They theatened of course. They threatened all sorts of things it was just one of the ways of interrogation to try and get information.
- Q. And what about your comforts in the prison Mr. Sanders? Did you got anything like a cup of tea, which is coming over to you new?
- A. I had tea, but it wasn't English tea.

- Q. I see, what are your plans new?
- A. Well I'd like to take a heliday on the continent, but it wouldn't be very far east on the continent.
