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How about your time in prison years in you were in solitary confinement most of the time I believe.

Thats right the whole times

You never heard or saw any of your fellow prisoners?

I only heard one who was in the cell next opr but one to me I recognised him by his footsteps walking past my cell as he went out to exercise that are aturday morning wash.

Apart from that you saw nothing of him?

I didn't see him at all. I just heard him thats all.

Did you know he had been released?

Yes because about April 1951 I heard him go down to the washouse Sat. morning and then on Sun. or Mon. I suddenly relised I had a heard his footsteps anymore. His door was a stell door and it had a peculiar way of opening and that door was rever open or shut so I put two and two together and relised he had been released at least either released or at any rate left the premises. 118 ft.

Mr. Vogler mentioned in a book he wrote Mr. Sanders; about the cold water treatment. Did you ever experience that?

No I don't know what cold water treatment is because I have heard about the cold water treatment. I was put into a cell with a stool pigeon during the interiory. gation time and he was talking to me about cold water treatment. They make them drink cold water as many glasses as they can. But I never experienced that. The Only cold water treatment I experienced was washing in the morning about 5 in the morning in a icy cold ... icy cold bath-house, where you had to strip to the waist and have a good doing underneath the tap. That's about the only cold water treatment I had. That's about the only cold water treatment I had. How about the general treatment of you in the prison.

Did they look after you or ill-treat you in any way? They treated me very well indeed I have no complaint at all in that respect.

And what about the treatment before the trial?

Before the trial it wasen't very pleasant because you see at no time was I afraid that they were going to ill-treat me because either xxxx one of two things either intelegated me pretty throughly thoroughly and smacked me around give me a few smackes on the jaw you know and so an and so forth. Thats a favourite treatment I understand, and then they released me. Well in that case I still have the British government behind me to take up the case of maltreatments. If they had me up in the court I would have started talking about maltreatment there so ther magain I had the British government behind me. And I had no personal fear of being maltreated at all. They threatened of course. They threatened all sorts of things it was just one of the ways of intelegation to try and get information
