6.35PM. MR. SANDERS ARRIVES AT CROYDON.

MR. EDGAR SANDERS ARRIVED IN A PRIVATE CHARTERED AERO-PLANE AT CROYDON TONIGHT. LOOKING PALE BUT SMILING HAPPILY

HE STEPPED DOWN AND WAVED TO THE WAITING CROWD.

HE SAID "IT WAS A GOOD TRIP. I HAVE BEEN ENJOYING MYSELF VERY MUCH SINCE THEY SET ME FREE."

6.37PM. EGYPTIANS ATTACK ARMY WATER PLANT.

CAIRO, THURSDAY.

THE BRITISH ARMY AUTHORITIES TODAY REPORTED THAT ARMED EGYPTIANS ATTACKED THE WATER FILTRATION PLANT AT THE CANAL ZONE VILLAGE OF FARANA LAST NIGHT.

THE ATTACK WAS UNSUCCESSFUL. ROAD BLOCKS WERE TODAY PLACED ROUND FARANA AND TROOPS SEARCHED ALL VEHICLES FOR WEAPNS.

6.42PM. UNITED NATIONS. ADD LLOYD.

THE TURKISH DELEGATE SAID HIS COUNTRY'S INTEREST IN THE INDEPENDENCE AND UNIFICATION OF KOREA WAS NOT NEW NOR SELFISH.

"WHEN THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA BECAME THE VICTIM OF UNPROVOKED AGGRESSION, TURKEY WAS AMONG THE FIRST COUNTRIES TO RESPOND TO THE APPEAL OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL, SENDING ITS FORCES TO DO ITS SHARE UNDER THE UNIFIED COMMAND, IN THE TASK OF REPELLING AGGRESSION," SAID SELIM SARPER. HE REFERRED TO ARTICLE 60 OF THE PANMUNJOM AGREEMENT, WITH ITS STIPULATION FOR A CONFERENCE ON BOTH SIDES.

"WHETHER WE LIKE IT OR NOT," HE SAID, "WE MUST COMPLY WITH THIS PROVISION LEST WE WRECK THE ENTIRE STRUCTURE AT THE VERY START. IF WE WISH TO STRETCH IT TO THE BREAKING POINT, ANYONE COULD ARGUE THAT THE SO-CALLED CHINESE VOLUNTEERS HAVE NO RIGHT WHATSOEVER TO BE REPRESENTED, SINCE THEY WERE "VOLUNTEERS" AND THEREFORE NOT ACTING ON BEHALF OF ANY STATE."

If you were assessing it editorially, what would you say?

Interviewer: How about your time in prison ~~xxxxxx~~ you were in solitary confinement most of the time I believe.

Sanders: Thats right the whole time.

Int: You never heard or saw any of your fellow prisoners?

San. I only heard one who was in the cell next door but one to me I recognised him by his footsteps walking past my cell as he went out to exercise on Saturday morning wash.

Int. Apart from that you saw nothing of him?

San. I didn't see him at all. I just heard him thats all.

Int. Did you know he had been released?

San. Yes because about April 1951 I heard him go down to the washhouse Sat. morning and then on Sun. or Mon. I suddenly realised I hadn't heard his footsteps anymore. His door was a steel door and it had a peculiar way of opening and that door was never open or shut so I put two and two together and realised he had been released at least either released or at any rate left the premises. 118 ft.

Int. (C.UL) Mr. Vogler mentioned in a book he wrote Mr. Sanders; about the cold water treatment. Did you ever experience that?

San. No I don't know what cold water treatment is because I have heard about the cold water treatment. I was put into a cell with a stool pigeon during the inter-rogation time and he was talking to me about cold water treatment. They make them drink cold water as many glasses as they can. But I never experienced that. The only cold water treatment I experienced was washing in the morning about 5 in the morning in a icy cold ... icy cold bath-house, where you had to strip to the waist and have a good doing underneath the tap. That's about the only cold water treatment I had.

Int. How about the general treatment of you in the prison. Did they look after you or ill-treat you in any way?

San. They treated me very well indeed I have no complaint at all in that respect.

Int. And what about the treatment before the trial?

San. Before the trial it wasn't very pleasant because you see at no time was I afraid that they were going to ill-treat me because either ~~xxxx~~ one of two things either interlegated me pretty ~~xxxxxx~~ thoroughly and smacked me around give me a few smackes on the jaw you know and so on and so forth. Thats a favourite treatment I understand, and then they released me. Well in that case I still have the British government behind me to take up the case of maltreatments. If they had me up in the court I would have started talking about maltreatment there so ther again I had the British government behind me. And I had no personal fear of being maltreated at all. They threatened of course. They threatened all sorts of things it was just one of the ways of intelegation to try and get information

San. I had tea but it wasn't English tea. ~~nothing~~ 25

Int. Another thing which must have amazed you and I hope it also pleased you when you saw your entire family arrive at ~~Katzen~~ Vienna.

San. That I certainly did.

Int. What was your first reaction when you saw them?

San. Well I was surprised that the girls had grown up beyond recognition. ~~And~~ I believe the youngest Derise you hadn't seen for some considerable time.

Int. Six years was it?

San. Yes six years. I saw the other two just before I was arrested in Vienna.

Int. I see. And this is now your first visit back to England since 1946 was it?

San. 47 I left England in February 1947 when I went back after I was demobed.

Int. [I see what are your plans now?] Do you intend to I don't suppose you won't go back to the part of world from which you have just come.

San. [Well I'd like to take a holiday on the continent but it wouldn't be very far east on the continent.] END

Int. Will you ~~work~~ carry on working for the same company?

San. Yes that's right. I'm sent to wherever the Company sends me.

Int. Well thank you very much indeed Mr. Sanders and I hope that ~~you~~ now your back you'll find everything just as it was before this awful affair occurred.

San. I hope so.
