FOREIGN MINISTERS - ARRIVALS.

At the Foreign Office in London, an International Conference brings Monsieur Bidault, Mr. Eden and Mr. Foster Dullas together. Britain America and France are to review world problems. Few details of the talks will be released, but doubtless Trieste will figure prominently. For years now the city and the two valuable ports of Trieste have been in dispute. After the first world war Austria ceded it to Italy. Now Yugoslavia demands Zone A, a sector, controlled by British and American troops since the end of world war two. Jubilant Italians hoist their national flag above city buildings when they hear the Anglo-American agreement that possession will in fact go to Italy.

British and American troops will soon be marching out of Zone A. Then, presumably, the Italians, who regard the control of Trieste as a matter of national pride, will march in. Meanwhile Tito and his Yugoslav forces keep watch across the border. In their zone of the city demonstrators march in protest against the Allies' decision. Then they attempt to storm the British and American consulates, despite Tito's plea to avoid violence.

Tito believes that his country, which fought alongside Britain in the last war; should have Trieste rather than the Italains who were our enemies. With strong forces to back him, Tite now threatens to send troops into Zone A. If the Italians march in - but the Yugoslav dictator seeks a meeting between the four countries involved, to try and find a peaceful solution to the Trieste problem.
