HEW ZEALAND - TANGIWAT RATL CRASH RIGHS 136.

These are the first newsreel pictures of the tragic rail crash at Tangiwai. On Christmas Eve the Wellington to Auckland express plunged into the Wangschu River when it crossed a bridge that had been weakened by severe fleeding. A great wall of water which swept down from a mearby velcame. Of the 278 passengers and crew on board, 136 are believed to have perished.

Later, at Wellington, hundreds of relatives of the dead gather for a mass funeral. The Duke of Edinburgh and Mr. Helland, the New Zealand Prime Minister, attend the burial of 21 unidentified bodies. A wreath of red roses, blue hydrangea petals and arum lilies is laid by the Duke.

To many of the bereaved, the Duke has words of sympathy and comfort. In her Christmas medsage to the Commonwealth, the Queen said that there was no-one in all her lands who would not grieve at this most tragic disaster.

Soon it is the turn of the Maoris to honour the Queen, their highest chieftain. At Waitangi, Her Majesty is challenged by a chieftain who lays a stick, representing the seaged, at her feet.

The crowd swarms forward as the reyal visitors walk behind the chieftain to the site where 113 years age, the Maori ceded their land to Queen Victoria. Now, in welcome to Queen Elizabeth, ritual chants are sung by wives and daughters of Maori chiefs -

To salute the Queen, the men-folk perform a fierce war-dance.
