Now meet the man responsible: Morman Hartnell, who designed the Queen's wedding and Coronation dresses. Awarded the M.V.O. last year, Hartnell started dressmaking thirty years ago, and was the first designer of his kind in this country.

"Hortensia" is the name of this magnificent ball gown. Lustrous lilac-tinted matin, stiffly spread over a hooped undershirt, plus large clusters of colourful hydrangeas add up to glamour and luxury in the typical Hartnell manner.

Now a suit specially designed for a day at the races. With great optimism, a large black cartwheel hat is worn - just in case of sun. Called "Goodwood", the suit is of tailored lace. Another winner from the Hartmell stable is "Belle de Nuit", this charming evening dress and full length coat; and again, the accent is on lace, silver for the dress, black for the coat.

Back to sacing again. Called "Hawthern Hill" this one's made of deep olive-green silk speckled with white.

Now Hartmell himself lifts the veil on two more of his creations - on the left, White Peacock; on the right, Pirst Affair. White Peacock is a gown of white satin with a peacock blue Backet. Both gown and jacket have embroidery of Turqueise and aquamarines.

And here's First Affair again, a picture frock composed of white grosgrain - a remantic creation for the sumlit days shead.
