GRIN AFTERMATH OF FLOODS:

Grim haves in the wake of the werst floed disaster in the history of the H.S.W. North Geast. Twenty three people died, hundreds of valuable cattle were drawned, homes were swept bodily away — millions of pounds worth of damage was done. Now these stricken people are struggling to start all over again. THAT takes courage. This house was swept half a mile across the town of Lismere, Over-all lies the sickening stench of death. Gattle lesses have been appalling and most of the carcasses were swept to sea. Foul mud and alime covers everything — paddecks, reads, the interiors of houses, shops, churches. And over present is the threat of disease. A span of the Bridge at Gasine was torn out by a wall of water, 50 feet high. But already gangs are on the job making temporary repairs. For truffic must move.

Luggrae hay as been flown in and is distributed to starving cattle. Grafton cleans up, Demage here was fortunately far less serious than at Lismore, Casime and Geraki. The new dry, Gollan Hotel, Lismore, which 10 days before the flood sheltered the Queen and the Dake, for a night. They still can find a suile. Shep girls wash out damaged goeds that must be sold at sacrifice prices. Store keepers last tens of thousends of pounds worth of stock. Hens and meat polluted by the river, must be disposed of. According to the Mayor of Lismore, there is over a quarter of a million pounds worth of food, new furniture and clothing bags of grain and other goods dumped on this tip. Devastation in the wake of a flood. Only the people whe lived through it can know its real horror.
