On the Thames at Wallingford the Oxford crew prepare for their hundredth boat race against Cambridge. Determined that victory will go to the Dark Blues, Oxford's crew coach, A.D. Rowe has them hard at work. In the bow is R.A.Wheadon of Cranleigh and Balliol. Australian E.V. Vine is number two.

Gebbe, another Australian is number three. Raikes is number four. Next on the line is the President, Quick, an old blue. McLeod number six, and Pain make up the Australian quartet. Up in the stroke's seat, is J.J. Harrison of Trinity.

With Wally Marsh as Cox, the Oxford crew (who average twelve-stone four pounds) certainly look to be in great form and they're rapidly improving. Meanwhile, the Cambridge coach, Dr. Owen is getting the light blues into trim on the River Ouse near Ely.

J. Wallis, an old blue, is bow. J. Stancliffe, is next and in number three is D.K. Hill.

K. Masser is number four, with follow Trinity man, M.G. Baynes number five.

G.M. Davies is from Clare College, so is J.N. Bruce.

M.J. Marshall, the stroke, is the lightest oarsman in the crew whose average weight is about six pounds heavier than their Oxford rivals.

J. Tanburn is the Cox. Along their traditional course, from Putney to Mortlake, Oxford and Cambridge will soon fight out their centenary race.
