The limer Sethie drops anchor at Aden. She has travelled about eighteen and a half thousand miles around the globe, and Aden, the gatemy between East and West, is her last port of call. On her journey she has taken our Queen to many lands, to meet many people. The scene at Aden is typical - thousands of cheering, leyal subjects, welcoming their our Queen on their our soil.

Important as a seal and oil station as well as a trade route, Aden has a mixed population of Amba, Indians, Pakistanis and Semalis. Eagerly they gather for a glimpse of their royal visitors when in Grescent Gardens, Her Majesty and the Duke attend a great military parade. Taking part in the march-past are Government Guards, Aden Protectorate Levies, the Aden Armed Police and the Hadhrami Bedouin Legion.

Immediately following the armoured vehicles come the Campl troops.

Now, for the first time during the tour, the Queen holds an investiture in public. Air Marshal Sir Claude Polly, Commander in Chief Middle East Air Porce, receives the accolade. He uses a chair, following the custom of the Meslems, whose religion forbids them to kneel to anyone but Allah. The Counciller of the Kathiri State in Eastern Aden receives the accolade.

Although the temperature is about minety degrees, the Queen appears coel throughout the lengthy coronny. During her two-day stay in the Protectorate, the Queen expresses her confidence in the future of Aden, which she describes as an outstanding example of colonial development.

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
