By tradition this is Ladies' Day, and down there, in amongst the grey toppers, there's an Ascot-type fashion parade going on. Plain Song and Sybil's Niece jump into the lead at once as they head away uphill towards the bushes. Lester Figgott, the Derby winner, keeps Brilliant Green well back. Ferry Box is near the front and Babella, one of the four French challengers, is going steadily. Angel Bright is moving up.

Down they come towards Tattenham Corner. Sybil's Niece and Angel Bright are just ahead of them all. Aliscia is there and Amora is going well on the outside. Angel Bright moves up a little - could be a royal victory.

Keep an eye open for the only grey in the race - Sun Cap, number 21. Rae Johnstone's bringing her up from behind - a typical Johnstone move this - just watch Sun Cap open up - it's going to be another Johnstone victory. Angel Bright has weakened and Altana and Philante have moved up. Its Sun Cap all on her own now.

Its still Sun Cap in front, but Altana, Philante and Bara Bibi are fighting it out behind.

Sun Cap wins by six lengths. Altana and Philante are second and third. All three are French horses - a bitter pill for English racegoers to swallow. Sun Cap's owner, Madame Forget, leads home the victor.

Sun Cap, obviously a nervy young lady, wins £11,000 for Madame Forget, and for herself the proud title "Champion Filly of 1954".
