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MAN OF THE HOUR -

About four months ago, at the Arc de Tricophe, our cameras filmed an event that was to be a turning point for France. Prime Minister Laniel and Defence Minister Pleven attended a correspy to honour the thousands of French seldiers who had died in Indo-China. Then the crowds led by war veterens, began to demonstrate against the Government's handling of the Indo-China campaign - it was the beginning of the end for Leniel.

At the Quai d'Greay, fellowing elections, the new government posed for the cameras, a government formed of many parties, led by M. Mendes France, here with President Coty. Mendes France was a new name to most ef us. But now that he was Premier, it wasn't leng before the world realised that here was a man of action, a man who made bold decisions and kept to them. The small, modest car, which he drove himself, symbolised one aspect of the small, modest man - he was a Premier without pretensions. It was in the Mational Assembly that he made his boldest move - he pledged that he would bring about the end of the Indo-China war within a month, by July the 20th - or resign. The man, chosen by France as her 20th. Prime Minister since the war had sourage.

Within minutes of making his pledge the Premier met America's Mr. Bedel Smith, and told him of his target.

Mr. Eden toe was teld of the Premier's plans. Pierre Mendes Prence, during the war, fought in the resistance movement, and, later in the Pree Prench Air Porce. His biggest tussle was to come - with Mr. Molotov at Geneva, and he had to succeed before July the 20th. Meanwhile he met Mr. Dulles in Paris, to calm America's fears that Prence, in her eagerness for peace, might give way to the Reds too easily.

Later, with Mr. Eden, but without Mr. Bulles, the Premier left for Geneva. July the 20th was not far off. In Paris, they followed the progress of the talks.

At last come the day. But there was still no decision. In Geneva two meetings were held. Peace hung in the balance. And then, not long before midnight, the news came through - Mendes France had won. In the conference rooms at Geneva, the war in Indo-China has ended. With Chou En Lai, the Chinese Communist Premier, Mendes France had agreed the terms of armistice. In Pierre Mendes France, our friends across the Channel have found a ferceful, determined leader - a true "Mr. France".
