INDO-CHINA - THE AFTERMATH.

As the guns are ellenced throughout Indo-China, the exchange of prisoners-of-war begins. Under protection of the Red Gross, French and Viet Nam troops (many ceptured at Dien Bien Fhm) are taken abcerd ships of the French navy. After their 56 day seige in the fertress, these men were taken prisoner and forced to walk for weeks to camps in the North. The troops, most of whom serve with the Foreign Legion, are all in very poor health.

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The first enchange involved 100 men from each side. These are Viet Minh. They exchange their clothes with their former ensuice, following an ancient custom. But for the civilian population, the missary is not yet over. Thousands who fled their homes have nowhere to live, but social workers have been organised in the towns to keep them fed. Helpings are meagre, but no child goes without its milk every day.

The plight of the thousands of refugees is a major problem. The warhas ended, but its victims still suffer.
