

CANADA: DUKE'S TOUR CONTINUES.

The Duke of Edinburgh visits Whitehorse, the capital of the Yukon territory, during his short tour of Canada. A trip on the paddle-steamer "Klondike" is on his itinerary. Only about 4½ thousand people live in this little village, which remains as it was during the gold rush of more than fifty years ago. One of the most cherished souvenirs of those days is the original cabin built by Sam McGee, whose name is still recalled in barrack-room ballads.

A plane is seen speeding the Duke of Edinburgh, who wears a safety jacket, on to isolated villages north of the Arctic Circle. On the Great Slave Lake is Yellowknife, a small mining town. Celebrations include buffalo-burgers for the children. Mustard served with a paint-brush amuses His Royal Highness who samples both buffalo and bison meat during his visit. At another village, called Coppermine, the Duke meets the 70 Eskimos in the community. Explaining his visit to Canada's North West, the Duke says he read stories about it as a boy and ever since has had the ambition to see the territory for himself.

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
