TORIADO HUTS LONDON - DUNLIN STORM DAVAGE:

A freak ternado which ripped across the suburbs of West Lenden, leaves behind a trail of haves, reminiscent of the war-time blitses. In the late afternoon, the ternade struck, Within seconds its damage was dene. Eurricely rescue teams went to work, but by a miracle noone was killed. One of the first places in the whirlwind's path was Gunnerabury, where the roof was tern off the station. About twenty people were on the platform at the time, but only eight received injury.

The hardest hit area was Acten, where walls were ripped down by the whirling wind of air. Brilliant flashes of lighting lit London as the freak sterm carved its path of destruction.

Dablin, too, has suffered grievous damage. The railway bridge was totally destroyed by the swellen unters of the River Telka. The river, which is normally only inches deep, rose to 20 feet and broke its banks. A state of emergency has been declared for the city following flooding on a scale unknown in Dublin for about a century.

Hundreds of families are evacuated from their flooded homes. Rowing boats, menned by police and ambulance men, keep up a shuttle service to clear the striken areas. Latest news from Dublin tells how squads have blown up the remains of the smashed railway bridge in an effort to save nearby houses from complete destruction,
