

"TYphoon" TYSON'S TEST TRIUMPH.

Len Hutton and his lads now lead the Australians by two games to one, following their sensational victory in the Melbourne test. There can have been few more thrilling games than the third test. The issue hung in the balance until the Aussies began their second innings needing 240 to win. Then Tyson took the ball.

Tyson, the Typhoon, hurled 'em down with devastating effect. Quickly the wickets began to tumble. Brilliant behind the stumps was Godfrey Evans, who took three catches. It was he who started the collapse. He bowled magnificently, yet claimed only two victims. Vice captain Arthur Morris fell to Tyson. So did Bonand - and Harvey, and Miller. Then three ducks - Madlocks, Lindwall and Johnstone. Tyson's reign of terror had smashed the Aussies. Back in Middleton, Lancashire, his mother read the headlines that acclaimed her son.

Mrs. Tyson was interviewed by our reporter at her home.
