An evacuation xxxxxix ship arrives at Formosa bringing civilian refugees—parents and children— from Nationalist China's outlying Machen Islands, besteged by the Communist Chinese, Before landing they receive a chemical spraying as a heldth measure.

After a hazardous journey they have received a refuge on Formosa. — to be joined soon by Chinese troops, which the American N avy is evacuating from the rocky Tachens.

Southwest in the island syudded Formosa straits lies ationalist held Quemoy — an island outpost deemed strategic to the defense of Formosa. The United States has not committed itself to defend Quemoy, which the Communists have vowed to capture. Despite the mounting tension, inhabitants of the little island go about their business under the guns of Red China—on the mainland, only five miles away

With Red Chna visible in the backgrou nd, guards patrol the island's beaches. Lookhuts study the nearby Red port of Amoy. Shore batteries practice against sudden attack, while Quemoy watches, and waits for its fate.
