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THE DUKE IN GLASGOW:

His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh tours Kelvin Hall in Glasgow, after he has declared open the Scottish Dairy Show. Cattle, naturally enough, are among the main attractions. The Duke, when he opened the show, remarked that although it might seem strange to hold such an exhibition in the middle of a large industrial city, it served to remind town-dwellers of the difficulties faced by farmers in providing dairy produce. About 150 trade stands cover almost every branch of farming.

After his visit, lasting about an hour, the Duke moves on to the City Chambers where, in the Banqueting Hall, he receives the Freedom of the City of Glasgow. Following the reading of the Burgess ticket, His Royal Highness signs the Burgess Roll.

Watched by Magistrates and Members of the Corporation, the Duke receives from the Lord Provost a casket containing the Burgess Ticket. The casket is made of oak from the Glasgow Cathedral roof, and was originally grown in the Forest of Luss. The Freedom ceremony is thus complete and His Royal Highness makes a speech of thanks.
