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During his tour of South Africa, the Archbishop of Canterbury visits Victoria Falls and sees the statue to David Livingstone. With Doctor Fisher is his wife.

At the Rhedes-Livingstone Memorial Museum, the Archbishop shows a keen and informed interest as he studies the exhibits at some length.

At the famous falls themselves, Dr. Fisher does not appear everawed by the grandeur of the scene. He smiles as he points out to his wife the "Devil's Cateract", where North and South Rhedesia are linked.

The falls were named after the British Queen by Livingstone himself - exactly one hundred years ago.

A patient and enthusiastic photographer, Mrs. Fisher, gets pictures of the rainbow over the falls.

Altegether a pleasant and impressive interlude in the Archbishep's teur.
