ROLL THREE -

G.V. Assmbled people at Hoy pumping station, Queen Mother arrives, and is met by the Governor of the County, Brig. Murray and then takes her place on the dais.

Queen Mother preses button which starts pumps which operate fountains. Queen Kother enters station, inspects filtered and unfiltered water samples and unveils plaque.

Queen Mother inspects filters, pumps etc., Queen Mother with her Caithness "neighbours".

GENERAL NOTES ON WATER SCHEME

As late as 1930, the rural population relied on dip wells for water.
Ashavarn dam raises Loch Calder 6' and forms reservoir of 1,450 million gallons. Later dam is to be raised a further 5' to store 2.800 million gallons.

Water is MMN used to generate electricity to operate the pumps. Filtration is necessary to remove high peat content which makes the water quite red in colour. This scheme is unique MANAGEMENT in that it supplies the whole County and is operated by its own power.

Caithness is a comparatively flat county.
Hey supplies water to the Castle of Mey. Cost so far:- £750,000.
