PHOTO FAIR THE FIRST BILNWIAL

PHOTOGRAPHIC INDUSTRY EFFORT

For the first time in 20 years the photographic industry in Great Brihain has combined to present a national-scale exhibition of the products made in this country and those marketed here from overseas.

Called the Photo Fair, it will be opened at the New Horticultural Hall, Westminster, at 11 a.m. tomorrow, Monday Lay 16, by the Marquis of Ely.

(On Monday, it will be for the <u>Trade Only</u> until 4 p.m. After that time it will be open to the public on Monday, and then on each day from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. until Saturday, 21 May).

Already plans have been made to hold the second Photo Fair, at Olympia, in 1957.

The main task of the show is to put before the "man-in-the street" in Britain, the latest equipment in the photographic world. <u>RANGE OF EXHIBITS</u>.

The number of amateur photographers in the country has grown tremendously since the end of the war. Before 1939 Photographic Societies membership totalled 30,000; now it is estimated there are 70,000 members.

Over 50 firms, with 100 stands, are represented, and exhibits cover the whole range of photography, including medical, scientific, architectural, industrial, and the Armed Services.

They incorporate new inventions of a revolutionary nature; equipment never before seen in Britain and modifications and improvements to equipment already well known.

There are examples of photographic craftsmanship in the sub-miniature field; ranging from the world's smallest cinecamera to cigarette-lighter size cameras; a camera which is helping in the fight against cancer; cameras capable of taking the most intricate photographs such as the pattern of closely woven fabrics; new inventions in lens production and in general accessories; equipment which makes underwater photography simple for the amateur; chemicals and paper; gadget bags and items of historical importance in the evolution of photography.

INDUCATIONAL FACILITIES

The Photo Fair will not only be an exhibition, but will provide educational facilities each day in a series of talks designed for both amateur or professional. These range from theories on lens systems to a talk on the photographing of beautiful women.

Visitor participation will be encouraged, and exhibitors will loan syncro-flash equipment to members of the public bringing their own cameras, to enable them to take indoor photographs.

One feature will be the presence each day of girls from T.V., Stage and Screen, professional models and Holiday Camp Bathing Beauties, who will attend the Fair to pose for amateurs.
