

WIMBLEDON: THE MEN'S SINGLES.

The final battle for the men's Singles Title is the big event of Wimbledon's annual championship meeting. This year it's American Tony Trabert (on the left) and Denmark's Kurt Nielsen.

Princess Margaret and the Duchess of Kent are here to watch the deciding match.

Nielsen serves...the Dane is an unseeded player, so to have reached the Finals is a great achievement. But Trabert is the No.1 seed, and hasn't lost a set in all six rounds.

Nielsen's service is his greatest asset, and it helps him take a few games from the agile American. But not a set.

Trabert serves. Nielsen is battling hard, but the American's everywhere at once. He takes the first two sets 6-3, 7-5 dominating the court with play as near perfect as Wimbledon has seen.

Now Trabert's serving for match point, with the score 5-1, in the third set. The gallant Dane is tiring fast.

And there goes the winning stroke - way beyond Nielsen's reach! Twenty-Four-year old Tony Trabert is Wimbledon Champion for 1955. And he's smashed his way to victory without dropping a single set, the first man to do it since Donald Budge in 1938. The Duchess of Kent gives the cup to a great champion.
